Motion as Amended: That the UTSSA will create a working group composed of SRC members and other students to organise a UTS based Yes campaign for the Indigenous Voice to Parliament referendum.

Action:

- That the UTSSA will establish Voice referendum working group will be comprised of :
 - The UTSSA Indigenous Officer.
 - The UTSSA Executive.

- Three other UTSSA Councillors which will be determined by way of expressions of interest sent to the Assistant General Secretary and ratified by the existing committee
- And all Indigenous Collective members.

Meetings will be called by the UTSSA Assistant General Secretary and meetings chaired by an Indigenous committee member.

8.2 HECS Indexation

Preamble: Last week, the Federal Government regretfully refused to act in the best interest of young Australians, instead choosing to exacerbate the growing generational wealth gap. The increased Higher Education Contribution Scheme (HECS) indexation needs to freeze - to help ease the burden of student debt, compounded severely by the rising cost of living crisis currently unfolding. The Federal Government needs to tackle these issues, and not further the intergenerational wealth crisis unfolding in Australia.

Motion:

- 1) That the UTSSA expresses its regret and disappointment of the Federal Governments decision to sideline the unfolding student debt crisis by palming it off to the Universities Accord process.
- 2) The UTSSA notes this decision will only lengthen and further exacerbate the effects of HECS indexation and urges the government to listen to the voices of students to act in ending the unfair practices of HECS indexation.

8.3 Youth Allowance

Preamble: Disappointingly, the Federal Government has decided to reject the recommendations put forward by the National Union of Students to raise the rate of Youth Allowance, furthering the inane impacts of the cost-of-living crisis.

The Federal Government will spend \$368 billion dollars on submarines, however, will not spend anything on the future leaders of this country, leaving students to fend for themselves in an unprecedented cost of living crisis.

Motion:

1) That the UTSSA condemns the Federal Government in refusing raise the rate of Youth Allowance and lower the age of independence to 18.

- 2) That the UTSSA notes this decision will condemn students into abject poverty and homelessness.
- 3) That the UTSSA acknowledges the work of the National Union of Students and other student unions in campaigning for adequate and necessary reforms to Youth Allowance and welfare payments.

Aylin Cihan Women's Officer's Report

At the end of March 2023 the Women's Collective held a widely successful Women In Media panel with the Journalism Society and Communications Society. We had over 30-45 women attend the panel to speak with out amazing panellists who came from many different background in the media industry, including public relations expert LJ Loch, filmmaker, Mitzi Goldman, Writer, Mawunyo Gbogbo and journalist Alicia Vrajlal. Each of these women came and gave a great insight into working in such a male dominated industry sharing there unique personal stories that assisted many of the young women in the audience. The students were also able to ask the panellists vital questions to help advance their own knowledge of what to expect in the workplace and facilitated a comfortable environment for many people to network and make new connections. Overall, this event was a major success and helped achieve the Women's collective goal to ensure that we host projects that links women who are studying with other women in established industries to promote further connections.

In April, I had also attended a meeting to discuss a new project that would ensure that women's and gender neutral bathrooms would be stocked with hygiene products to accommodate for individual that menstruate. This initiative is still in the preliminary stages but the WOCO recognises the importance of having free menstrual products on campus to ensure that no one is suffering from period poverty as it is an essential item just like toilet paper or soap. I have also taken part in a project with the help of Respect Now Always to reevaluate the consent matter module so that it reflects the current context and student experience. Ultimately, the WoCo is currently working on a couple projects this month and later through the year to better the experience of students and facilitate a safe and supporting environment.

We have also continued my correspondence with the UTS Academic Liaison Officers (ALOs) in regards to hybrid learning after having several meetings with various ALOs last month. The ALOs main job is to liaise between faculties and accessibility. They have been a great source of insight and information into what is happening with hybrid learning in the future and who to talk to about more detailed information. One such suggestion was talking to the Associate Deans of particular faculties. We are still waiting on some information and replies from the Associate Deans of various faculties. Sara Chaturvedi Queer Officer's Report

Things have slowed down since the hectic beginning of the year for the Queer Collective. The TDOV rally held on April 2nd turned out to be a success, with a turnout of around 3000 people who attended in an incredible show of solidarity despite the bucketing rain. I'd like to thank those from council who were able to attend – your support means a lot to us! Elections were opened for Convenor and social media Officer, and collective members Ellie and KJ were elected. In my discussions with our new convenor, we have plans for social events in the coming weeks for members to be able to wind down and relax during assessment season! Along with this, I was able to meet with Spence Messih, who runs Pride@UTS through CSJI. He loved our idea of a collective clothing swap event for members who may be struggling to find identity affirming and affordable clothes. We have also been discussing a collaboration with QC, CSJI, and Batyr for the upcoming IDAHOBIT. The collective is growing steadily, and the newly cleaned Queer Space is hardly ever empty these days! I hope that alongside our new convenor and social media officer, the collective will be able to hold more events in the coming weeks.

Boris Tam Environment Officer's Report

The last week of March and the beginning of April was an extremely busy time for the Environmental Collective. We had multiple events on Green Week, a Sydney wide cross-campus organised protest on the following week and a collective meeting the week after. As such, Stu-Vac was a welcome time to rest and reorganise.

The first event held on Green Week was the stall at the Green Market. While the zine workshop last month was a success, there were not enough zines made to be given away at the market. Instead I have given a space for market attendees to view and participate in placard painting, and also as an opportunity to promote the collective, similar to a stall at O'Day. I set out our existing placards at the stall and also set out the A frame with the enviro collective flyers, as it is quite eye catching. I spoke to a lot of passers-by about the collective and handed out some flyers, who were interested due to the design of the flyers. In doing so I gained a handful of sign-ups. I also was able to advertise the next event at Green Week, which was the film screening. In speaking to the market attendees, I was able to promote the Enviro Collective as a niche that is separate from the other societies present at the market; in promoting system change rather than individual change. It was definitely beneficial to have the presence of the other societies to show that there is genuinely space for both forms of action simultaneously in the climate movement. Furthermore, the collective gained the assistance of a dedicated graphic design student.

The Green Week film screening was for the 2017 film Okja, which was a satire of corporations appearing environmentally friendly. This event was advertised through the Enviro Collective social media channels, as well as the social media accounts for UTS Film Appreciation Posse's, UTS Sustainability and UTS Eco Society. This is a great indication towards further collaboration with Enviro Collective and these societies

upcoming. The screening was held on Thursday of Green Week. Leading up to the screening, there were posts and reminders daily. The screening was ultimately quite enjoyable and reaffirmed the position of the Enviro Collective being critical of corporate and government greenwashing.

During this time and after, the collective was working with our counterparts at USyd and UNSW in planning and promoting a protest against Tanya Plibersek for approving new gas wells to run until 2077. This was very important because it indicates our first University led and protest, and directly targets actions from the environmental minister. This action provides credibility towards the values of the Enviro Collective. The protest was pushed through social media, and a new Cross Collective Enviro page and group was created, with the idea that future protests and collaborative events would be promoted there. I had the opportunity to chair the rally and lead the march which was extremely passionate. All parts of the protest went according to plan, and will definitely pave the way for similar action to happen in the near future.

Following this protest, another meeting was held during Stu-Vac and I was able to gain new insights on what needs to be done in the remaining weeks of the semester. Educational workshops will be the focus of the coming weeks and months. The education will be centred around food security in Sydney, and with the information presented and discussed at these educational events, we will be starting a campaign in the University to promote food security. Suggested ideas were establishing sustainable sourcing for the food at the food pantries, putting a focus on local gardening through the garden at UTS, and reducing prices for food at UTS so that the price is not a barrier to food security.

Finally, the Enviro Collective will also begin focus on promoting the next city wide climate strike to be held on the 5th of June. The June Climate Action building has already begun with graphics already being promoted and spread, and contingent events to be posted shortly. More cross-campus building has already been scheduled and, given the ample time to build, we are expecting a very positive turn out for this event.

Vertigo Team's Report

Over the past month, the Vertigo Editorial Team finalised our roll-out of Vol. 1, with all copies removed from the office and the vast majority of these removed from stands. We have also been working on Vol. 2, due for release late this week or early next week depending on the speed of delivery. Other exciting initiatives we worked on in the past month included a collaboration with UTS Engage, who asked for permission to reconfigure and repost Vertigo content from Vol. 1, and the redrafting and refining of the two new student-based Instagram series mentioned in last month's meeting. These series are set to debut next week. In addition to these developments, we have held talks with UTS Library about the curation of an exhibition which celebrates 50 years of UTS student publications. The exhibition in question will examine the past, present and future of UTS student publications as well as the careers of notable Vertigo alumni. We are currently enlisting the help of readers/volunteers to assist in the research

and curation processes. Vertigo's social media following continues to grow at a gradual rate.

Our current Instagram following of 2,370 signals a 12% overall increase since the incumbent Editorial Team took over, despite the annual loss of graduated students.
